Country Watch Eden/NFU	The grant will be used towards funding a trial of a 'tracking bolus' designed by the 'Big Fix' television show on the BBC. The bolus has been designed to help to combat sheep theft. It is swallowed by the sheep using an applicator and can stay in the sheeps stomach for three years. Cost per application is about £1.	Within the farming community there are many who are made to feel vulnerable as a result of rural crime this can range from the very young to the elderly, an effective crime prevention solution could help them to feel safer and less fearfull of crime.	£2,000.00
Allerdale Girls Football Club	A donation of money from the PCC's Property Fund will assist in providing all the age group teams with much needed equipment and reasources.	The club provides an oppportunity for girls who have never played the sport before to try something new, increase self-esteem, build experience of teamwork and learn respect for others through a structure of values and codes of conduct.	£2,500.00
1st Wigton Baden Powell Scouts	A grant of £2500 would allow the purchase of 28 poles. This would allow for challenging projects to be undertaken.	Involvement in such activities makes the Scouts rewarding, appealing and retains members. This is only one of the activities offered which taken as a whole develops young people and instills morality and positive values in society.	£2,500.00
1127 (Kendal) Squadron RAF Air Cadets	The grant will be used to purchase camping equipment that will allow groups of cadets to take part in adventurous training activities and camps. The tents, cookers, sleeping bags and mats will help to replace equipment lost as a result of Storm Desmond in 2015.	Air Cadets has as part of its core ethos a commitment for all its members to act fairly and impartially to all groups. It provides positive high quality activities as an alternative for young people giving them the focus that could otherwise fall on less socially responsible acts.	£2,500.00
Whicham Parish Council	The grant would be used to improve facilities at the Silecroft play area. We have already replaced the swings and a play centre. We intend to improve the tennis court by resurfacing and also create a basketball/footfall area. We then intend to install exercise equipment	The improvements to the facility are aimed at attracting teenagers/young adults to participate in various activities reducing the risk of ASB/criminal activities. At present there is very little for youngsters to do which only increases the risk of activities that have a negative impact on the local community.	£500.00
Cockermouth Titan's Rugby League Youth Team	To pay for the use of the sports centre and to pay for new equipemnt (Rugby balls etc.)	This gives local residents the chance to become involved in sport, and to learn the values and respect of team work.	£1,500.00

Brough Parish Council	This grant will be used to create 20 allotments on a new site already acquired from Cumbria County Council.	Young people will become positive, active members of this project; they will meet and work with others in a safe and constructive environment; they will be stimulated, encouraged and assisted by others to learn new practical and life skills for the future and be less likely to commit crime. These allotments will enable elderly and vulnerable people to take part, even if just a small raised bed meets their needs.	£2,500.00
Wath Brow Hornets ARLFC Youth Section	To purchase new tackle bags, tackle shields, agility equipment and also shelving so that they can store all the new equipment in the youth storage container.	Discipline and respect is a big part of the sport, the club prides itself on its success over the years with the amount of young players who have come through the clubs youth structure and became professional rugby league players.	£2,491.20
Chofhs Youth Group	If successful this funding will be used to equip the group with the following: 2 x 2 seater sofas Playstation PS4 Table Tennis Table	This group provides a much needed service to the village and as a result there has been a dramatic fall in ASB within the village and surrounding area.	£1,968.91
Cleator Moor Celtic Football Club	The donation of funds from the PCC Property Fund, will assist the organisers of the club to purchase kits and equipment for three junior football squads, each squad will be provided with kits including football shirts shorts and socks at a cost of £573.00 per team, medical bags at a cost of £28.00 per team, water bottles and carriers at a cost of £34.00 per team, footballs, training cones and bibs at a cost of £157.00 per team. Cost per team £792.00, total cost for three teams £2376.00	The club is funded purely on charitable contributions and local sponsors, and is an ideal organisation to promote the positive affect on the reduction of youth ASB in the area and as one of the football coaches pointed out, "It gets the youngsters off the streets and provides a disciplined environment for them", whilst also providing them with alternative activities during the evenings and school holidays it provides a regular diversion from ASB in the area and is run to improve youth's fitness and improve their attitudes to others, ultimately, in some cases, encouraging them to take up the sport fully	£2,376.00
Dalton Detachment, Cumbria Army Cadet Force	The staff and cadets of Dalton Detachment respectfully request to be considered for a grant from the PCC Property Fund in order to allow the purchase of equipment for use in training the cadets.
