

Cumbria Youth Commission on Police and Crime: Application Notes

Please read carefully before filling in your application form.

1. What is the Youth Commission on Police and Crime?

The Youth Commission enables young people to inform and support, the work of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cumbria, Peter McCall. The project allows young people to get involved and have their say about policing and crime where they live.

The Cumbria Youth Commission was established in April 2017 with funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cumbria. In its first two years, the Cumbria Youth Commission have engaged with over 3,000 young people across Cumbria to gather their views on important issues such as Hate Crime, Abusive Relationships, and Substance Abuse.

2. Who can join the Cumbria Youth Commission?

We are looking for participants aged 14-25 years who are currently resident in Cumbria. The role is open to anyone in this age group living in Cumbria – including Barrow-in-Furness, South Lakeland, Copeland, Allerdale, Eden and Carlisle.

In total, we are seeking to recruit up to 15 young people in 2019, to join the existing group of Youth Commissioners. We are looking for people who will be good team players, who will be committed to the project and willing to do all the activities involved. We are also very keen to ensure that the Youth Commission is made up of a diverse group of young people who broadly reflect the make-up of the local population, including those who may have direct experience of the police and justice system.

3. If I join, what will I have to do?

Between May and December 2019, members of the Youth Commission will:

- **Take part in Youth Commission sessions:** You will participate in 5 Youth Commission sessions which will usually be held on Saturdays (May, July, September, November, December).
- **Work on special topics:** As a group you will select priority topics to work on during your time on the Youth Commission. The shortlist will be determined by the Youth Commission and may include topics such as relations with the police, reducing youth offending, substance abuse etc.
- **Gather the views of other young people:** You will be given support to carry out peer research with other young people in schools, colleges, universities and youth groups. This can be done to suit your schedule and can fit around your existing commitments. We anticipate that each member will do in the region of 20 hours of peer research in total by the end of the project.
- **Plan events:** You will work in a team to design and plan interactive events to engage other young people and partner agencies in your area. You will be invited to help to run these events wherever possible and as long as there is no clash with your school/college commitments.
- **Report back to the Police and Crime Commissioner:** You will contribute towards the analysis of information gathered from young people in your area, and help to present back your conclusions to the Police and Crime Commissioner.
- **Help to host the Youth Commission Conference in December 2019:** You will have the opportunity to present your results and recommendations and be a part of discussions with the Constabulary, partner agencies and other young people.

4. What will I get from being part of the Youth Commission?

- **Discuss issues with the Police and Crime Commissioner, police and key partners:** You will meet the Commissioner, police and other partners at Youth Commission events and help them to understand what young people in your area think about police and crime.
- **Develop your skills and experience:** You will gain valuable skills and experience, which you will be able to use for your CV or applications to Further or Higher Education.
- **Become ambassadors for other young people:** You will give a voice to young people in your area by helping them to get their views heard.

- **Meet new people:** You will meet a diverse range of other young people from the Cumbria area, and work alongside professionals from different organisations.

- **Section 1:** if you are under 18 you must also fill out the section regarding your Parent /Guardian /Carer. They will also have to complete and sign a Consent Form to give their permission for you to participate.
- **Privacy:** Your privacy is really important to us. By filling in the Cumbria Youth Commission application form, you are consenting to Leaders Unlocked using your personal information to keep in touch with you over the course of the project.
